ince its founding in 2015, the International Society of Substance Use Professionals (ISSUP Global) has grown into a worldwide professional community of over 45,000 members from more than 200 countries and territories. ISSUP provides training, resources, and support to strengthen substance use prevention, treatment, and recovery efforts globally.



Within this global family, ISSUP Nigeria, formally launched in October 2019, stands out as a vibrant and fast-growing chapter that exemplifies how local leadership and commitment drive national progress.

While ISSUP Nigeria joined the global network a few years after its inception, it has swiftly emerged as one of its most dynamic chapters, not by catching up, but by carving a

unique path of innovation and impact within the Nigerian context.

A Journey of Steady Growth

Over the years, ISSUP Nigeria has organized six national conferences and annual general meetings, professional development trainings, launched active state branches in 29 states out of the 36 states and the Federal Capital Territory, partnered with universities to introduce addiction studies, and hosted 27 ISSUP Nigeria webinar sessions and dozens of state branches' webinars on evidence-based prevention, treatment and recovery reaching over 20 million people across Nigeria and globally.





These milestones demonstrate the power of shared purpose and strong leadership. From a modest beginning with just a few passionate professionals, ISSUP Nigeria has grown into a thriving community of over 3000 members across the country. These members include prevention practitioners, treatment providers, researchers, students, recovery advocates, and policy influencers, all united by a shared vision for a drug-free Nigeria.

EDITORIAL: PREVENTION IS NOT OPTIONAL. IT IS A NATIONAL PRIORITY

Every year, the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking provides individuals, organisations, and governments worldwide with an opportunity to reflect, recommit, and strengthen strategies to address the global drug problem. This year's theme, "The Evidence is Clear: Invest in Prevention," could not have been timelier. ISSUP Nigeria went beyond commemoration. We mobilised, engaged stakeholders, and delivered measurable impact across the country.



With over 20 active state branches, we witnessed what becomes possible when professionals, educators, health workers, security agencies, traditional rulers, religious leaders, parents, and young people unite around a shared vision. From school sensitisation to community outreach, media engagements to government advocacy, one consistent message was delivered: prevention is not an afterthought; it must come first.

The results are significant. Thousands of students were reached, state and federal institutions were engaged, partnerships were strengthened, and a renewed national conversation on drug prevention took place. But more importantly, we are helping to shift public thinking. We are building a culture of early action. We are no longer waiting for



addiction to take root before responding. We are acting now with purpose, with evidence, and with unity.







Prevention is not just another programme. It is a smart and essential investment. The UNODC World Drug Report 2025 affirms that global instability is compounding drug-related harm and insecurity, calling for urgent prioritisation of prevention. According to the International Narcotics Control Board (INCB), every dollar invested in prevention can save up to ten dollars in future health, social, and security costs. The message is clear. What we do now determines what we are spared from tomorrow.



Here in Nigeria, our prevention strategy must reflect our realities. These include diverse communities, constrained resources, and strong social foundations. ISSUP Nigeria's strength lies in localising global best practices and applying evidence in practical, context-appropriate ways. From Enugu to Oyo, Lagos to Kwara, our members are demonstrating that prevention can be effective, scalable, and community-led.





This special edition of The Solace highlights the passion, creativity and collaboration that shaped our World Drug Day 2025 activities. But more than a celebration, it is a call to action. We cannot afford to stand still; the time to act is now.

WORLD DRUG DAY 2025: STRENGTHENING PREVENTION ACROSS NIGERIA

ISSUP Nigeria Chapter proudly joined the international community in commemorating the International Day Against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking on 26 June 2025. In alignment with this year's global theme, "The evidence is clear: invest in prevention," the chapter mobilised its state branches and partner organisations to deliver a range of impactful, emotionally resonant activities aimed at preventing drug use and promoting public awareness.

DELTA STATE: A KINGDOM MOBILISES FOR CHANGE



In a deeply moving campaign, ISSUP Delta State joined forces with the National Drug Law Enforcement Agency (NDLEA) Delta Ports Command and His Royal Majesty Kingsley EmakpoOrereh, the Ovie of Agbarha-Warri Kingdom, for a four-day community-based sensitisationprogramme across seven communities: Otovwodo, Igbudu, Edjeba, Ogunu, Okurode, Oteghele, and Ukpokiti. The king himself led the charge-educating his people on the dangers of drug abuse and declaring support for rehabilitation and reintegration.

But perhaps the most stirring moment came when the people of Agbarha-Warri watched their king lead the charge against addiction. His voice carried not just royal authority, but the collective pain and hope of a people determined to break the cycle.











The Monarch provided the necessary support, while Comrade Nosa Godswill (PRO), Miss Augustina Oyubu, and Miss Edesiri led outreach efforts. In a historichonour, the monarch was decorated as a WADA Ambassador by NDLEA Commander Ann Nnenna Okoebor.

NIGER STATE: HIGH-LEVEL ADVOCACY WITH DEEP CULTURAL ROOTS

In Minna, ISSUP Niger State, led by the Coordinator Amb. Lawrence Paul, partnered with the NDLEA to host a grand commemorative event attended by dignitaries including the Deputy Governor His Excellency Comrade Yakubu Garba, the Secretary to the State Government, Hon. Commissioners, and traditional rulers. The Emir of Agaie represented the Etsu Nupe, anchoring the effort in tradition and respect.



The First Lady was represented by the Special Adviser on Women Affirmation and Mobilisation. The Governor, his wife, and the Deputy Governor were all honoured for their contributions-making this one of the few state-led efforts that received official state-level commendation and visibility.



This was more than a ceremony—it was a powerful endorsement of ISSUP Nigeria's mission at the highest level.



ENUGU STATE: A FULL-CIRCLE APPROACH TO INSTITUTIONAL PARTNERSHIP





Led by the acting state coordinator, Mr David Folaranmi, ISSUP Enugu launched a multi-layered campaign of advocacy visits, school-based education, and professional alignment. They met with the Nigeria Security and Civil Defence Corps (NSCDC) State Commander, Dr Elijah Etim Willie; NDLEA Enugu State Commander, Mr Abel Sunu Wadahi and Commissioner for Health, Dr Obi Emmanuel Ikechukwu. Each pledged new collaboration on prevention.





At the Institute of Management and Technology(IMT) Enugu, the Rector, Prof. Dozie S. Ogbodo pledged institutional support for student-led awareness campaigns. At the Federal Neuropsychiatric Hospital Enugu, the Medical Director, Dr Ngozi Unaogu agreed to a collaborative framework bridging prevention and clinical care. The campaign concluded with a strategic meeting with University of Nigeria Enugu Campus (UNEC) Deputy Vice-Chancellor Prof. J.U.J. Onwumere.

These efforts are not isolated, they mark a strategic shift toward embedding prevention in systems that shape policy, education, and health.

It also participated in the MTN Anti-Substance Abuse Programme (ASAP) alongside Dr Mosun Belo-Olusoga (Chairperson, MTN Foundation), Mrs Odunayo Sanya (Executive Director, MTN Foundation), and Dr. Martin O. Agwogie (National President, ISSUP Nigeria).



FEDERAL CAPITAL TERRITORY, ABUJA: THE CAPITAL SPEAKS THROUGH THE AIRWAVES

At the nation's capital, ISSUP Nigeria members engaged thousands through a live radio broadcast on Wazobia FM, discussing the science and heart of prevention. With contributions from professionals and advocates, the broadcast explored early intervention, support systems, and real-life testimonies.

This media advocacy provided a voice for the voiceless, placing the message of prevention in homes, buses, and market stalls across Abuja.





This powerful use of media reinforces ISSUP Nigeria's belief that awareness must travel as far and fast as addiction does.



ABIA STATE: GOVERNANCE MEETS GRASSROOTS

As part of World Drug Day 2025, Abia State witnessed a landmark development that brought prevention into the heart of local governance.

In Aba North Local Government Area, Hon. Timothy Iheke formally inaugurated the Aba North Drug Control Committee, the first of its kind in the state. This initiative marked a strategic move to integrate drug prevention into community leadership and decision-making processes.



The event was a key highlight of Abia's World Drug Day activities and featured the active involvement of the ISSUP Abia State branch, coordinated by Dr. Azu Oko. Alongside other critical stakeholders, including faith leaders, youth advocates,

educators, health professionals, and security agencies-the branch contributed to shaping the committee's structure and vision.







This was more than a commemorative event. It signalled a systemic shift, turning prevention from a campaign into a civic priority. By establishing this committee, Aba North has created a replicable model for grassroots engagement in drug control and community resilience.

ISSUP Nigeria commends the leadership of Aba North, the contribution of ISSUP Abia State, and all partners who ensured that World Drug Day 2025 was not only observed but used as a platform for lasting change.



CROSS RIVER STATE: PARENTS AT THE CENTRE OF PREVENTION

Partnering with the Federal Neuropsychiatric Hospital Calabar, ISSUP Cross River hosted a virtual seminar on "Parents as Partners". The session featured mental health professionals who taught caregivers how to spot early warning signs, initiate difficult conversations, and access support.



This quiet but powerful session empowered the real frontline workers: parents.

ISSUP Nigeria recognises that when families are strong, communities stand resilient.



KWARA STATE: A WEEK-LONG MARCH TOWARD AWARENESS

ISSUP Kwara, in collaboration with NDLEA Kwara Command, the State Drug Control Committee, the Office of the Special Assistant to the Governor on Drug Abuse Prevention and Control, and local NGOs, coordinated a full week of activities.



Sensitisation drives reached schools, markets, and mosques, engaging diverse audiences. The week culminated in a pledge for continued community-based advocacy.



The week may have ended, but ISSUP Kwara's work has only just begun—and ISSUP Nigeria celebrates this sustained commitment.



OYO STATE: YOUTH LEADING THE PREVENTION CHARGE



In Ibadan, the student arm of ISSUP Oyo organised school visits to Ikolaba High School and Bodija International School. Miss Tirenioluwa and her colleagues from the Department of Health Promotion and Education, University College Hospital (UCH), led sessions on health risks and refusal skills.





Partners included the Association of Lady Pharmacists, Counselling Association of Nigeria (CASSON), the Association of Social Workers of Nigeria, and the Society for Family Health, which offered free hepatitis C testing at Gate Bus Stop.



From health education to hands-on testing, this was prevention in action—and led by the next generation.


Oyo shows that when community is empowered, prevention becomes a culture, not just a campaign.
